### **Sample Itinerary**

#### **Day 1**

##### Arrival and First Encounters with Bordeaux

## **Day 2**

The experience may continue in the Chartrons district, once the beating heart of Bordeaux's wine trade, where elegant merchant houses and former industrial spaces now coexist with galleries, design boutiques, and contemporary art institutions. Here, Bordeaux reveals a more modern and experimental identity without losing its historic soul.

## **Day 3**

### Vineyards, Medieval Heritage, and Sacred Landscapes

Beyond the city, the Bordeaux region unfolds as a cultural landscape where wine, architecture, and history are inseparably connected.

Experiences may include a visit to a family run château, offering insight into the traditions of regional winemaking, followed by a relaxed lunch amidst the vineyards. These moments provide an intimate encounter with the rhythms of rural France and the culture of hospitality that defines the region.

The journey may continue to Saint Émilion, one of France's most atmospheric medieval towns, where cobbled streets, monastic history, and extraordinary vineyard landscapes come together in a uniquely evocative setting.

Nearby, the majestic ruins of a Romanesque abbey offer another perspective on the region's spiritual and architectural heritage, adding a contemplative dimension to the day.

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## **Day 4**

### Art, Architecture, and the Culture of Wine

This day explores Bordeaux's rich dialogue between artistic tradition and contemporary reinvention.

Experiences may include visits to major cultural landmarks, from Gothic religious architecture to distinguished fine arts collections, revealing the artistic breadth and historical ambition of the city.

The afternoon may be devoted to Bordeaux's celebrated relationship with wine through immersive cultural experiences that place viticulture within a broader historical and international context.

Optional evening experiences, such as opera or concert performances in one of Europe's most beautiful historic theatres, may add another layer of refinement to the journey.
